KDHS SCHOOL FARM—FARM MANAGER NEEDED

Kojonup District High School is very fortunate to operate a 480acre fully functioning farm, as part of our school program. Unfortunately, our long-standing Farm Manager is moving on, and after many months of searching, **we are still unable to fill this position.**

Our School Farm is a unique part of our school. Our farm allows for the curriculum to be hands on and students experience agriculture firsthand, the very industry our community is built on! The school farm also offsets the school's water supply for our ovals, hosts the annual District High School Cross Country event and many class reward days.

Our school offers a Certificate I in Agriculture for Year 9 Students and a Certificate II in Conservation and Environmental Management for Year 10 Students. This year, we had students travelling weekly from Katanning Senior High School to participate in the Certificate II, which has been a great success. Our students, across all year groups, benefit from our farm, by participating in a range of activities and experiencing the facilities it offers.

- A fully functioning classroom
- Shearing shed, crutching cradle, a weighing scale and undercover yards
- Basic orchard and large irrigated vegetable garden.
- We crop approximately 20 to 40 hectares a year for sheep feed oats and hay.
- Approximately 600 merino breeding ewes producing approximately 500 merino lambs a year and 100 crossbreds (Poll Dorset cross).
- Chickens – students raise day olds to 16 weeks and keep six chickens for school eggs/incubator eggs.
- Basic workshop with tools and equipment for servicing and fabrication.
- Indigenous gardens which are maintained by students.

Many of our past and present community members will have fond memories of the School Farm. There are so many benefits to having this asset attached to our school, but unfortunately without the staff to maintain and manage this facility, we will need to face some difficult decisions. **We are reaching out to our community - if you know anyone or are interested in this position or are able to offer short-term assistance, we are keen to hear from you!**

If we are unable to find a Farm Manager, then the future of our farm will be in jeopardy.

FARM MANAGER

Our School Farm is looking for a permanent Farm Manager. It is a full-time position, however we will negotiate work fraction if necessary.

Kojonup DHS school farm is 480 acres and unique in that we only have one full time employee overseeing the operation. We crop approximately 20 to 40 hectares a year for sheep feed oats and hay. Approximately 600 merino breeding ewes producing approximately 500 merino lambs a year and 100 crossbreds (Poll Dorset cross). We sell whether and crossbred lambs and keep ewe lambs.

The role is supported through our local Farm Advisory Committee, Principal, Farm teacher and Manager of Corporate Services.

The key responsibilities of the position are:

- Oversees the management of the School Farm.
- Manages and maintains daily operations and enterprises on the farm, which may include livestock management, cropping, land care, mechanics and infrastructure maintenance.
- Assists in the development and implementation of the farm plan.
- Assists the Farm Teacher in the development of agricultural training programs.
- Provides information and advice to the Principal, Farm Teacher and Agricultural Advisory Committee.
- Follows procedures and processes to maintain primary industry enterprises, vehicles, machinery and buildings.
- Assists in the development, implementation and review of the farm budget.
- Assists in delivering educational programs, and resources relevant to primary industry curriculum.
- Maintains Grain and Livestock registers.
- Undertakes weekend work when required – although this is minimal and seasonal.
- Provides instruction and demonstrations to groups of students with Farm Teacher present.
- Ensures best practice approach to safety and health to meet the statutory requirements relating to Occupational Safety and Health, adhering to directives from the Department of Education, biosecurity, quality assurance and animal welfare.
- Assists in construction of OHS Procedures associated with Farm Enterprises.

FARM TEACHER REPORT

Term 3 ended and Term 4 began with several sporting carnivals and Country Week taking our students away to participate in other educational pursuits. Students assisted with tagging, drafting sheep, and preparing sheep for sale in Week 2.

Term 3 consisted of shearing, fencing, lamb marking and general maintenance and construction. From these practical activities, classroom work focused on animal welfare, the definitions of the different laws and legislation which contribute to animal welfare and how sheep farmers manage these constraints.

Fourteen of our Year 9 students have recently achieved their Certificate I in Agriculture. The remaining Year 9 students are busy completing their written modules and practical assessments. The Year 7s and 8s complete agriculturally-based bridging course work as precursor to achieving their Certificate I in Year 9. Year 10s are currently completing their Certificate II in Conservation and Ecosystem Management module and are progressing with meeting the completion deadlines.

New design and technology curriculum being imposed as of 2026 expresses engagement of student's interest in the sustainability and problem-solving realms of technology. The focus of the design process moving towards project management and delegation with AI. This will have a very minimal effect on our curriculum content as its contextual to our School Farm and our calendar activities.

A majority of the Year 10s can now drive, to different levels and many have earned their 'farm licences'. They drive under strict supervision with Mr Holland and Ms Shepherd, and over half of the students have learnt how to drive a manual vehicle for the first time. Students turning 16 this year will apply for their learners permit, and those going to Ag schools have prior practical learning driving a vehicle.

As 2025 comes to a close, we say goodbye to our Year 10 students and many of our Year 9s going to Agricultural Colleges. It is always a privilege to see the agricultural achievements of our alumni students. In 2023, Libby Hardingham, now in her 20s, was the youngest competitor in the National Merino Fleece Young Judges competition held in Launceston. This year, she named as a national finalist for young merino fleece judge competition in Adelaide, achieving third place overall in Australia. This week, Jack Leusciatti achieved the Year 11 Intensive Farming Award from Narrogin Agricultural College. Students have such a wonderful introduction to agriculture at KDHS. We are truly privileged to have a School Farm.

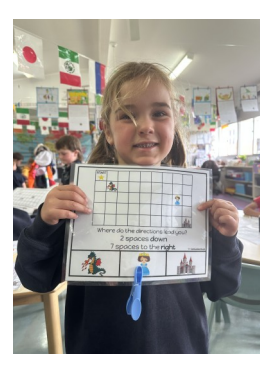
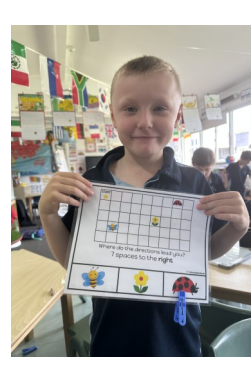
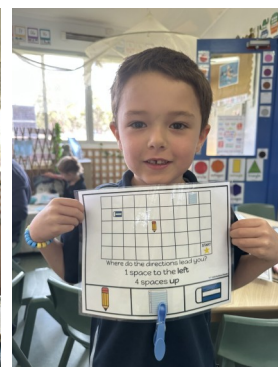
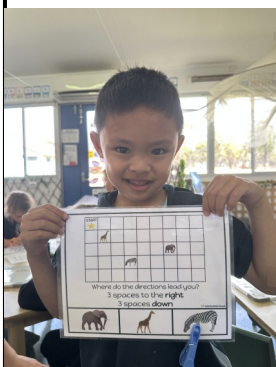
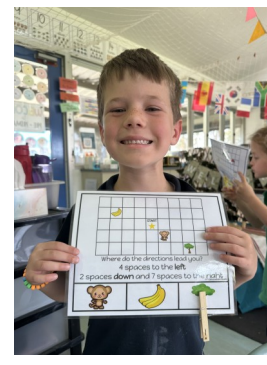
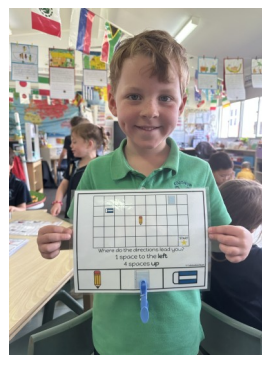
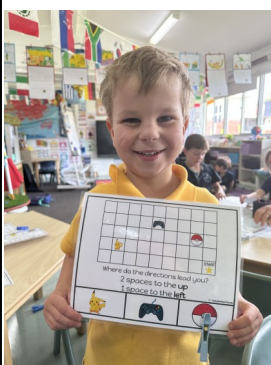


AROUND THE WORLD WITH PRE-PRIMARY

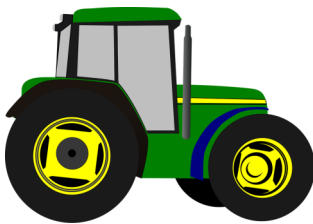


YEAR 9 DINNINUP SHOW EXCURSION

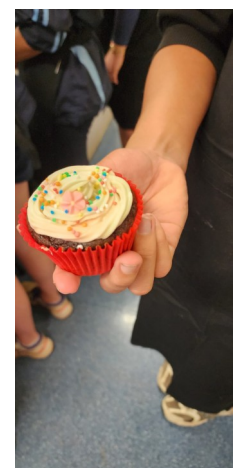

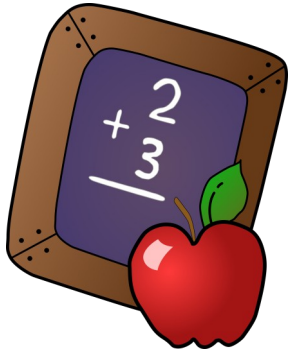
On Thursday the 6th November, students from Katanning Senior High School and Kojonup District High School participated in the Barista Course hosted by our TAFE Career Taster Program.

MATHS MADNESS!!

These games can be played with a normal deck of cards. Use the Jack =11, Queen =12 and King =13

Ten or Twenty

Practice Concept(s): Addition

Each player is dealt five cards, and the remaining cards are placed face down in a pile at the centre of the table. Flip over the top card from the pile and place it face up next to the pile; this will be the start of the discard pile. On each player's turn, the player may pick up the top card in the face-down pile or one card from the discard pile, and that player must use exactly three cards to add up to ten or twenty. If a player cannot make a set adding up to ten or twenty on their turn, that player discards one card in the discard pile and the next player goes. If the player can make a set of cards with a sum of ten or twenty, they place down that set on their turn, pick up three new cards from the face-down pile, and discards one card to end their turn. (Players should end the turn with three cards.) The player with the greatest number of sets at the end of the game wins.

Math Boggle

Practice Concept(s): Arithmetic (Addition, Subtraction, Multiplication, Division)

If you've already played the regular game of Boggle (finding words in multiple directions from a set of 16 letter cubes) learning this game will be a cinch. For this game, each player will also need a pad of paper and a pencil. Lay 16 cards down on the table face-up in four rows and four columns. Set a timer and when you call "Go!", players look to see where they can find equations among the sixteen different cards. Players can write down equations that go vertically, horizontally, diagonally, and even zig-zag, so long as the cards are in order and are touching at a side or corner. For example, if a player finds a 4, 3, and 1 next to each other, they can write " $4 - 3 = 1$ " as an equation, or " $1 + 3 = 4$ " as another equation. However, if the player finds a 3, 4, and 1 in a row, they cannot rearrange the numbers to make " $4 - 3 = 1$ " or " $1 + 3 = 4$ ". For starting players, allocate more time, such as five or seven minutes. For more experienced players, begin reducing the time down to as little as two minutes.
